
Offering & Gifts

MATTHEW 13:1-23

"But the seed falling on good soil refers to someone who hears the word and understands it. This is the one who produces a crop, yielding a hundred, sixty or thirty times what was sown." — Matthew 13:23

PRESENT: Susan Hunting, Mary and Jeff Krejci, Jody and Diane Weaver, Deb Sitzmann, Gene Groetken, Harold Werley

Susan opened the meeting with prayer.

MINUTES Minutes from the May 8th meeting were reviewed. Motion by Diane to accept the minutes, 2nd by Jeff; motion passed.

DAYCARE PROJECT

Jody met with Robin Beck, Becky Thomas, Stee Maxwell, and Mary and Jeff Krejci on Monday, June 9th. We received a copy of the lease for the Daycare wing late today. Robin clarified that the lease is between Moville United Methodist Church (listed as the LANDLORD) and MCDAI (listed on the lease as the TENANT.)

There will be an Operating Agreement between MCDAI and Crittenton Center.

Jody, Mary and Jeff visited the Crittenton Daycare site on Morningside Avenue and received a tour of the facility on May 29th.

PARSONAGE UPDATE Jody reported that our insurance policy on the parsonage will cover lost rent after the fire. Larry Etler made a copy of the parsonage lease and is sending it to the insurance company for action.

We feel there is no need to keep the insurance policy on the parsonage as it is. Motion by Jody to change that policy to just liability on the parsonage, 2nd by Deb; motion passed.

The insurance adjuster was here Monday (June 9th) for another walk-through of the parsonage. \$425,000 is the coverage on the parsonage. A contractor has noted that he is interested in buying the house. It is estimated at a cost of \$20,000 to demolish it and haul it away.

Jeff will check with the conference on ownership of the house and how the proceeds would be handled if we were to sell it.

Harold reported that Sara is in the process of removing her belongings from the parsonage. Rent for October, November, and December 2024, and January, February, and March of 2025 was received from the Sioux City Housing Authority rent assistance program. Sara still owes \$2620 back rent. We are holding a deposit in the amount of \$1250 that will be applied to this amount, leaving an unpaid balance of \$1370. Motion by Jeff to forgive this \$1370, 2nd by Diane; motion passed.

TREASURER'S REPORT/MISSIONS

Income for the month of May, 2025, was \$3000 below budget. Year-to-date income is \$1400 above 2024 Y-T-D for the same period.

We have paid for the last half of tuition for our Guatemalan student and have received a nice letter from her updating us on how she is doing and thanking us for supporting her. COMMITTEE REPORTS

Community Basket

Ingathering Update

During February, March and April, 16 Personal Dignity (health) Kits were prepared for the Ingathering this November.

The Ingathering Task Force awarded 32 Hunger Grants from funds given at the November 2024 event. The Community Basket received one of the \$410 grants and is sponsored by Moville UMC.

<u>Mission Moment</u> Living Heritage Foundation Scholarship Program

We provide a scholarship for Leslie Jimenez a student in Western Guatemala. She is in grade 11. Her school year is from February to November and we provide tuition assistance plus funds for her to participate in the Lifting Up My Student program which provides online courses with private tutors to help with subjects at school. Your gifts make a difference in Leslie's life. Leslie's scholarship is totally funded by your donations (no money comes from the church budget). Leslie's scholarship for 2025 is \$1490.00. A container remains on the table at the back of the sanctuary for your donation. Your help is really appreciated for the 2025 school year.

Heifer Highlights:

Fatuma grows soybeans, sunflower, maize and sesame on a plot of land in northern Uganda and described her life as "hard". She lacked quality seeds and farming equipment and did not know how to improve her crops. Then she became a member of a local Heifer Coop and was trained in new farming techniques which improved her crop yields. She can now afford the fees to send her children to school. Please continue your support of Heifer as it gives a hand up to families like Fatuma's. Remember to feed Rosie the Cow.



Midwest Mission- "Sending hope and empowerment around the world and around the corner" On May 21, 2024 a violent EF4 tornado tracked across southwest Iowa devastating the city of Greenfield and surrounding areas causing more than 31 million dollars in property damage and killing five people. In response, Moville UMC prepared Personal Dignity Kits and along with those already on hand, 19 Kits were delivered to the Midwest Mission site in Jefferson, Iowa by Pastor Harold Werley. This is the way we as a congregation support the relief work of Midwest Mission.

Gifts through Moville UMC will help Midwest Mission replenish supplies and be ready for the next disaster.
