ADMINISTRATIVE COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES – Thursday, November 13, 2025

PRESENT: Susan Hunting, Mary and Jeff Krejci, Jody and Diane Weaver, Janice Schlotman, Deb Sitzmann, Kirk Scheelhaase, Pastor Eric Sayonkon, Nicole Jensen

Susan opened the meeting with prayer.

Nicole spoke to the Council in regard to a fundraiser for the Childcare Center. She is working with a group of people to put on a hot beef dinner and bake sale in our church Sunday, January 4, 2026. She will plan and prepare the meal. Our congregation is being asked for volunteers to serve and clean up. More information will be coming out on this.

MINUTES

Minutes from the October 9, 2025, meeting were reviewed. Motion by Kirk to accept the minutes, 2nd by Deb; motion passed.

TREASURER'S REPORT

October giving exceeded the budget by \$500. Y-T-D weekly giving through October, 2025, was \$70,000. For 2024, giving was \$61,000 for the same 10-month period.

We received \$2831 in interest from the initial parsonage insurance money that was invested in a 3-month CD at Security National Bank.

We will continue to receive lost income (rent) insurance payments through closing of the parsonage sale, estimated to be December 1, 2025.

PASTOR'S REPORT

Pastor will be attending the annual fall retreat with the Bishop in Des Moines tomorrow, 11-14-2025. Our district will be getting a new lay leader.

Sunday we will have a congregational meeting during our normal church service. Topics to be covered are: 1) Better communication and support, 2) Reaching out to our members and our community, and 3) Inviting and increasing discipleship and fellowship.

OLD BUSINESS

HALLOWEEN - We handed out 450 Halloween treats to children at the annual Halloween parade. We fell short by a few. Next year we will go back to having enough for 500.

PARSONAGE UPDATE - We accepted an offer from Jeff Petersen to buy the parsonage. He signed a Purchase Agreement and has paid the 10% as stated in that document. We hope to close on December 1st. Scott Gernhart has completed the survey. Thank you, Scott, for the quick work in getting that done.

DAYCARE UPDATE - We have received a set of blueprints for the daycare. They are available for your review. We should begin cleaning out items from the classrooms.

SNOW PROCEDURES - Cassie will post any weather-related updates to our church service on KTIV website and on our Facebook page.

SOUND SYSTEM REPORT - John Neely has made some repairs to the sound system in our sanctuary and they seem to have been helpful.

NEW BUSINESS

We plan to have a class for those adults who are interested in joining our church. We are hoping to have that next spring.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

FINANCE/MISSIONS - We have had a very good response to the collection of donations for our Guatemalan student.

The current balance is \$979.97.

SPRC - met with Shar Duncan and Vern Knaack from Correctionville, as well as Pastor Eric. After discussion, the three goals (mentioned above in PASTOR'S REPORT) were agreed upon.

Our next Administrative Council Meeting will be Thursday, December 11, 2025, 6:00 p.m. All are invited to attend.

ADMINISTRATIVE COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES – Thursday, December 11, 2025

Susan opened the meeting with prayer.

MINUTES

Minutes from the November 13, 2025, meeting were reviewed. Motion by Diane to accept the minutes, 2nd by Janice; motion passed.

TREASURER'S REPORT

November giving was \$500 below budget. Weekly giving Y-T-D for 2025 is \$77,000. Last year at this time, giving was \$71,000.

We received \$60,979.87 from the sale of the parsonage. Those proceeds have been deposited into a Security National Bank 30-month step-up rate CD at 3.5% interest, maturing June 1, 2028. We have an option, after 15 months, to withdraw half of the principle without penalty or step the rate up to the prevailing interest rate at the time. We currently have a CD of \$339,432.35 at 3.9%, which will mature April 10, 2026. We will be researching how to handle that money next year when that CD comes due.

The balance in the Guatemalan Student Account is \$1013.97.

PASTOR'S REPORT

We will be having a Christmas Eve service on Wednesday, December 24th at 5:30 p.m.

OLD BUSINESS

PARSONAGE UPDATE - We closed on the parsonage December 1st. We will continue to carry liability insurance on the property until spring.

DAYCARE UPDATE - At the last meeting with Crittenton, we were made aware that they need a dishwasher for their use. We are in the process of discussing where that will be located.

NEW BUSINESS

Plans are moving along for the Hot Beef Meal to be held in our church following church on January 4th, 2026. Sign-up sheets are in the church lobby.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

FINANCE/MISSIONS - We are committed to finish the support of our current Guatemalan student through spring, 2026. At that time, we will decide on our next mission project. We will have a financial audit spring, 2026.

MEMBER SUPPORT/EDUCATION - Sunday School will be presenting a Christmas program on Sunday, December 21st.

UWIF - Held our annual Christmas potluck on Wednesday, December 10th. It was well-attended. The group's focus is on providing supportive fellowship for all members. Our next Administrative Council Meeting will be Thursday, January 8, 2026, 6:00 p.m. All are invited to attend.

Our next semi-annual payment (\$745) will be sent in January 2026, then again in May 2026. Your generosity is making a tremendous difference in Leslie's life! Thank you!

Midwest Mission has purchased their Jefferson, Iowa facility and now has a permanent home. Through October 10, 2025 there have been 54 International shipments of supplies and 149 Stateside deliveries of supplies.

"MUMC has a Permanent Endowment Fund. Your charitable gift will continue to work forever. Gifts can be made outright, can be memorials to family or friends, or bequests within your estate planning. You may designate the gift to a specific fund within the endowment: General, Building, Missions, Special Ministries, or Education. The fund's interest earned may then be used. After the third quarter of 2025 the approximate interest values for each were: General \$31,500; Building \$6000; Missions \$450; Special Ministries \$260; Education \$3200.
